Begin with a flat hand in front to each side shoulder height, palm down and slowly lower the hands. Hint: Like a gesture often used for "calm down" or "quiet."

Put bent hand fingers, tips on middle of chest, palm in.

Past



Move the open right hand, palm facing back, from near the right side of the face back over the right shoulder. Hint: The hand moves back into the past.

Present



Bring both "y" hands, palm facing up, downward with a deliberate movement in front of each side of the body. Hint: In the present position.

Future



Bring the open right hand, palm facing left and fingers pointing up, forward in a double arc from the right side of the face. **Hint: The hand moves forward into the future.**

Imagine everything in your life is coming up roses — you've married your soul mate, have five beautiful children and a booming career. How easy it would be to say to God, "It is well with my soul."

Now, imagine all of that is taken away — it's just you and your grief-stricken spouse, nursing horribly broken hearts. Would it be as easy then to say to God, "It is well with my soul?" But that is the powerful truth behind this classic hymn — a truth that brings even more conviction to the soul-stirring lyrics.

This incredible story of faith belongs to Horatio Spafford (1828-1888). Much like Job, he placed his trust in God during his life's prosperity, but also during its calamities. A devout Christian who had immersed himself in Scripture, he had many joyous years of his life. He was a prominent Chicago lawyer, who's business was thriving. He owned several properties throughout the city. He and his beloved wife had four beautiful daughters and one son. Life was more than good — it was blessed.

But faith, no matter how great, does not spare us from adversity.

Just as Horatio hit the pinnacle of his profession and financial success, things began to change. It began with the tragic loss of their son. Not long thereafter, the Great Chicago Fire destroyed nearly every real estate investment Horatio owned.

Just a few years later in 1873, Horatio decided to treat his wife and daughters to a much needed escape from the turmoil. He sent them on a boat trip to Europe, with plans to join them shortly after wrapping up some business in Chicago. Just a few days later, he received a dreadful telegram from his wife, "Saved alone…" It bore the excruciating news that family's ship had wrecked and all four of his daughters had perished.

Horatio was on his way to meet his heartbroken wife, passing over the same sea that had just claimed the lives of his remaining children. It was then that he put his pen to paper and the timeless hymn was born, beginning with the words:

When peace like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say, It is well, it is well, with my soul.

It is incredible to think such encouraging and uplifting words were born from the depths of such unimaginable sorrow. It is an example of truly inspiring faith and trust in the Lord. It goes to show the power our God has to overcome even the darkest times of our earthly life.
